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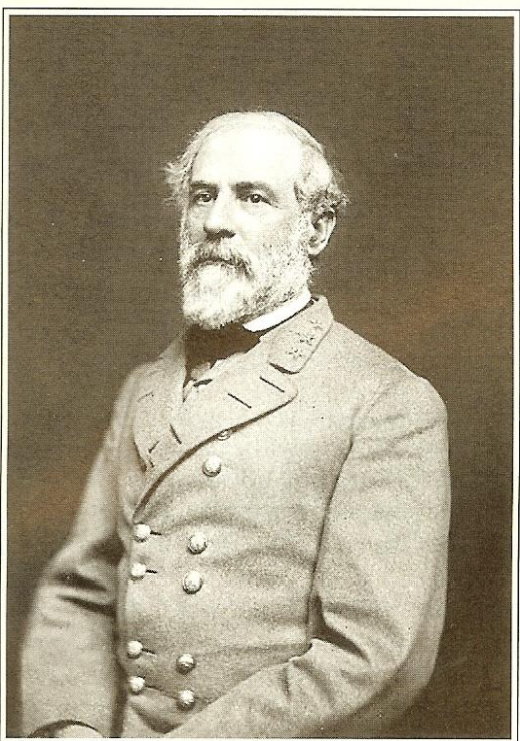
The Army of the Potomac and the Army of Northern Virginia were different kinds of armies, designed to fight different kinds of wars. — *Ethan S. Rafuse*

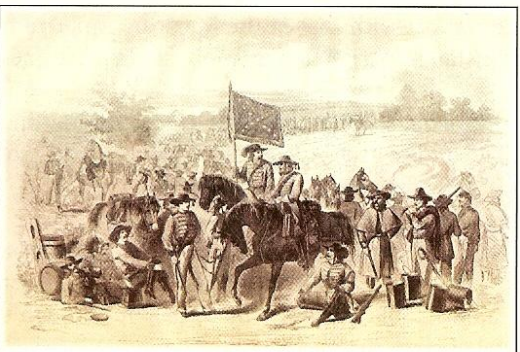
